The Growing Suburbs Fund is a contribution towards meeting critical local infrastructure needs for communities in Melbourne's diverse and fast-growing outer suburbs. It is positioned to quickly respond to the pressures being experienced by interface communities by bringing forward local infrastructure projects that will make a big difference in the day-to-day lives of outer suburban families.



The City of Melton is located approximately 40 kilometres west of central Melbourne and is considered one of the fastest growing interface councils. In 2017, the City of Melton had a growth rate of 5 per cent compared with the national average growth of 1.6 per cent. It is anticipated that Melton's population will more than double between 2017 and 2041¹.

Strong residential growth is expected to continue, with a number of new suburbs such as Aintree, Fraser Rise and Hillside currently under development.

MORETON HOMESTEAD PLAY SPACE

7 – 17 Morton Boulevard, Taylors Hill 3037

Background: The Growing Suburbs Fund will partner with Melton City Council to deliver precinct improvements at the Morton Homestead located in Taylors Hill.

The precinct improvement project will complete an important community hub through the provision of play and social spaces. The project will address significant gaps in open space infrastructure in Taylors Hill.

When completed, this open space hub will provide an opportunity for all sectors of the local community to play, recreate and interact with families, friends and neighbours.

This precinct improvement project will deliver the following:

- Shelter and picnic facilities
- Multiple seating points for respite and social interaction
- Local scale play space with a variety of equipment
- Natural play elements nestled within a forest
- Landscape and pathways
- Outdoor gym equipment
